39 **DISCUSSION AND VOTING ON TOWN WARRANT ARTICLES:**

40 **Mr. DegliAngeli, Town Engineer and Assistant Town Manager:**

41 Presented the proposed operating budget (\$12,082,831), Capital Reserve Funds, and warrant articles  
42 were reviewed while fielding questions from the Budget Committee and community members.

- 44 ♦ **Mr. Steer** inquired if the Budget Committee by agreement and through recommendation of an  
45 Advisory Budget Committee can alter the budgets. **Chair LeFebvre** explained Conway does not  
46 have an advisory committee. The Budget Committee has the authority to alter the bottom-line  
47 budget.  
48
- 49 ➤ Article 7: Operating Budget  
50 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 7 as written. Motion Carries. 9-3**  
51 **[Chair LeFebvre, Mr. Aughton, Mr. Drinkhall]-0**

- 53 • **Chair LeFebvre** moved to decrease the operating budget by \$200,000.

- 55 ➤ Article 8: Capital Reserve Fund for Infrastructure Reconstruction  
56 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Drinkhall to approve Article 8. Motion Carries 12-0-0**

- 58 ➤ Article 9: Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Equipment  
59 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Donohoe to approve Article 9 as written. Motion Carries. 12-**

- 62 ➤ Article 10: Capital Reserve Fund for Solid Waste

66 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired of the impact on the landfill expansion should the warrant not pass.  
67 **Mr. DegliAngeli** noted the longer you continue to wait to fund the project the increased amount  
68 of money will be asked for in the future. Being the town can ask for \$100,000 annually or \$1.8  
69 million when the expansion must be done.  
70
- 71 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Donohoe to approve Article 11 as presented. Motion Carries.**

79 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired if there were any anticipated repair expenditures for the “old” Town  
80 Hall? **Mr. DegliAngeli** noted the only know repair/replacement is the roof will need to be done  
81 within the next 5-years.  
82
- 83 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Donohoe to approve Article 13 as presented. Motion Carries.**

- 86 ➤ Article 14: Capital Reserve Fund for Parks Department Vehicles and Equipment

- 90 ➤ Article 15: Capital Reserve Fund for Police Vehicles  
91 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired why the Police Department switched from Ford to Dodge. **Chief**  
92 **Mattei** explained Ford no longer makes the Interceptor and only offers the SUV, which cost

93 \$5,000 more and the officers do not care for them. The department started switching over last year  
94 to the Dodge Charger which cost the same as the Ford Interceptor. There will be a transfer cost as  
95 some of the Ford equipment is not compatible with the Dodge.

105 ➤ Article 17: AEDs for Conway Police Department

106 ♦ **Chief Mattei** advised the current AEDs were purchased between 2003-2005 either do not work or  
107 no longer compatible with current CPR standards. **Lt. Scott** advised within the last 8 years the  
108 AEDs have been used 29 times with 4 of them being lifesaving. Further noting they are out of  
109 date and need to be compatible with the hospital and EMS.  
110

111 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 17 as written. Motion Carries. 12-**

114 ➤ Article 18: Radar Trailer for Conway Police Department

115 ♦ **Chief Mattei** noted the previous radar trailer broke several years ago and was disposed of.  
116 Further explaining the departments receives calls 2-3 times a week complaining about speeders.  
117 The radar trailer is solar powered and can be programmed to capture information during certain  
118 periods of time and may curtail some of the speeding issues. Additionally, noting he has applied  
119 for a 50/50 grant where the taxpayers would only have to come up with half of the \$8,500  
120 requested.

121 ♦ **Mr. Fougere** inquired if there is a tip line that can be utilized. **Chief Mattei** note there is not a  
122 tip line, however, anyone can call the department directly and make a report.  
123

124 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 18 as presented. Motion Carries.**

126 • **Mr. Donohoe** noted he feels this should come out of their operating budget. **Mr. Colbath** noted Chief  
127 Mattei presented a very conservative budget and put it out to the legislative body to decide if they want  
128 to spend the money. **Mr. DegliAngeli** noted Chief Mattei has applied for a 50% grant that may be  
129 adjusted at the deliberative session.

144 ♦ **Mr. DegliAngeli** noted this is a seed fund with a request for \$50,000. Additionally, the re request were  
145 broken into two as Article 21 establishes the fund and Article 22 regulates the account because of the  
146 licensing and fees associated with short-term rentals. Should the fund not be seeded initially, the fund will  
147 remain in place for anticipated revenue generated through the regulations.  
148 ♦ **Ms. Snow** clarified there was a discussion last year to hire a company or person to police the rentals. **Mr.**  
149 **DegliAngeli** confirmed there was however, with the pandemic and lack of proposed regulations it was  
150 postponed, and the position will begin in June. **Ms. Snow** inquired if the funding was in the budget. **Mr.**  
151 **DegliAngeli** advised it was. **Ms. Snow** again clarified there was a company hired. **Mr. DegliAngeli**  
152 advised a company was hired to perform an inventory of short-term rentals.

153

157 ➤ Article 23: Noise Ordinance  
158 ♦ **Mr. DegliAngeli** advised presently the town does not have a noise ordinance.  
159 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired where the sample came from and if there are any unusual issues. **Mr.**  
160 **DegliAngeli** advised the town of Durham's model was used and Mr. Holmes would have to answer the  
161 second question.  
162 ♦ **Mr. Corbett** inquired of the definition of the noise. **Mr. DegliAngeli** advised the ordinance does not  
163 address noise by decimals as it uses examples such as disturbing your neighbor, operating heavy  
164 equipment outside of the established times, anything that would cause loud unreasonable noises, etc.  
165 ♦ **Mr. Marvel** commented on cutting firewood and sighting in a rifle, which your neighbor does not like.  
166 **Mr. DegliAngeli** suggested reviewing section 97-6: b which permits power tools during 6:00 AM and  
167 10:00 PM.  
168 ♦ **Ms. Snow** inquired of the restrictions on businesses who have outdoor activities. **Mr. DegliAngeli** noted  
169 some of them operate under a special event permit which limits their time and anything outside of that time  
170 would be a violation of the noise ordinance.  
171 ♦ **Mr. Fougere** commented there must be exceptions when noise becomes excessive during permitted hours.  
172 ♦ **Mr. Colbath** commented this is a starting point and there will be exceptions and overkill which will be  
173 sorted out and revisions can be made based on use.

174

236 **DISCUSSION AND VOTING ON SCHOOL WARRANT ARTICLES:**

237 **Superintendent, Kevin Richard**, Presented the proposed operating budget and proposed warrant  
238 articles, fielding questions from the Budget Committee and community members.  
239

- 240 ➤ Article 2: Replacement of KHS Windows (\$1,300,000)  
241 ♦ **Mr. Richard** walked through the window replacement process to this point, which included the Conway  
242 School Board initially seeking out a contractor to look at the cost of the project. The initial proposed cost  
243 presented to the Conway School Board was approximately \$975,000, however, the School Board for a

244 variety of reasons decided to put the project out to bid. The next phase of the project was to have  
245 specifications developed to avoid inferior products. The School Board voted to allocate approximately  
246 \$75,000 to hire an architectural engineer firm to develop the specifications. Through an RFP Gale  
247 Associates were hired to develop the specifications and presented 85 +/- pages of specs, which were  
248 approved by the School Board. Gale Associates have put out an RFP in the newspapers as well as to other  
249 companies who have done similar projects on schools. The bids will be received and approved by March  
250 1, 2021 in time for the Deliberative Session. Gale Associates provided an approximate cost of \$1.3 million  
251 for the project and the School Board voted to bond the project.

- 252 ♦ Article 2 is for a bond in the amount of \$1.3 million without a significant increase to the tax rate, which  
253 will be offset by \$855,000 in revenue from the sending towns per the tuition agreements.  
254

255 **Mr. Corbett moved, seconded by Mr. Colbath to approve Article 2 as written. Motion Carries. 8-4**  
256 **[Mr. Drinkhall, Mr. Jost, Mr. Donohoe, and Chair LeFebvre]-0**  
257

- 258 ➤ Article 2a: Replacement of KHS Windows (\$750,000)

- 259 ♦ **Mr. Richard** advised this is for the same estimated \$1.3 million project with a different funding  
260 mechanism. This is to raise and appropriate \$750,000 to be added to the \$650,000 in the KHS  
261 maintenance trust fund and utilize these funds to pay for the window project. The difference being with  
262 the one-time cost with a significant increase in the tax rate, which will be offset by \$493,000 in revenue  
263 from the sending towns per the tuition agreements.
- 264 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired of the logic in using a warrant article to spend funds that have been contributed  
265 to. **Mr. Richard** clarified the purpose is related to the tax rate, being all at one time or spread out over  
266 several years.
- 267 ♦ **Ms. Snow** inquired if the sending towns contribute to the interest costs as well. **Mr. Hill** noted the sending  
268 towns pay 2/3's of the cost including interest regardless of the funding method used.
- 269 ♦ **Ms. Snow** inquired if this would be a 1-year project or several years. **Mr. Hill** advised the windows would  
270 be manufactured in July and August. In September and October some areas will have the windows  
271 replaced with most of the work taking place over the summer of 2022. **Ms. Snow** inquired why not raise  
272 the \$750,000 to pay for the windows and take the rest of the money out of the trust fund as needed. **Mr.**  
273 **Hill** noted the district would be expected to sign a contract and want to make sure the funds are available.
- 274 ♦ **Mr. Marvel** noted along with the KHS maintenance fund there is a school maintenance fund with  
275 approximately \$340,000 and a retained balance fund with approximately \$242,000, which all total \$1,25  
276 million. **Mr. Hill** explained to there is a process to get money released from the retained balance. The  
277 maintenance funds are not just for emergencies and are there to maintain the facilities and there are several  
278 big-ticket items coming up. **Mr. Marvel** noted an argument is being made for \$300,000 but not for the  
279 \$700,000. **Mr. Hill** advised it is an option for those who do not want to use a bond, however, with the  
280 interest rate at .75% over 5 years, he is in favor of bonding the project and keeping money in the  
281 maintenance funds.
- 282 ♦ **Mr. Marvel** commented the School Board should have utilized their latitude and trimmed the budget more  
283 rather than put it upon the voters.
- 284 ♦ **Ms. Snow** inquired of the logic in moving forward with Article 2 if both Articles 2 and 2a pass. **Mr. Hill**  
285 advised by statute the bond articles must go first. **Mr. Richard** noted Article 2a states "should Article 2  
286 fail".
- 287 ♦ **Mr. Marvel** inquired of the plan should both articles fail. **Mr. Richard** advised they would be back next  
288 year asking for funds for the same project. Further noting if the windows fall out the School Board will  
289 have to vote on next steps, which creates another issue with phasing the project without the same  
290 manufacturing company and materials. **Mr. Dziedzic** commented waiting another year will also  
291 create the bid to increase based upon the current trend.
- 292 ♦ **Mr. Donohoe** inquired if the RFP included a warranty. **Mr. Hill** noted a standard 5-year warranty comes  
293 with the windows; however, they have asked for an option for an extended warranty. **Chair LeFebvre**  
294 inquired if the old windows had a warranty. **Mr. Hill** noted if they did it is long past. **Mr. Colbath** noted

- 295 having a warranty will help the taxpayers not feel like we will be in the same situation. **Chair LeFebvre**  
296 inquired if the warranty will be part of the presentation at the annual meeting. **Mr. Hill** advised the  
297 presentation will include the final bid and the additional 5-year warranty.
- 298 ♦ **Mr. Davison** spoke of the potential safety hazard the windows are to staff and students. The voters have  
299 been provided with 2 funding options, although with the rates so low it makes sense to utilize the bond for  
300 a 5-year period, which will be offset by the sending towns. The concern is there are many projects coming  
301 up down the road and this one project could drain the maintenance accounts. Chair LeFebvre inquired  
302 when the maintenance fund was last used. Mr. Davison noted it the KHS fund has not been used.
  - 303 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired if there are any weak or failing spots on the KHS roof. Mr. Hill noted he is not  
304 aware of any.
  - 305 ♦ **Mr. Donohoe** commented on the roof replacement that has been projected to be approximately \$5 million  
306 and inquired why that would not be a bonded project. **Mr. Hill** advised as part of the strategic plan they  
307 entered all upcoming projects they were aware of for placeholder purposes. Further noting the roof projects  
308 could be done all at once or done over a period.

- 310 **Mr. Jensen moved, seconded by Mr. Corbett to approve Article 2a as written. Motion Carries. 8-4**  
311 **[Mr. Corbett, Ms. Leonard, Mr. Aughton, and Mr. Donohoe]-0**

  - 314 ♦ Current balance is \$659,000.  
315 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Jensen to approve Article 3 as presented. Motion Carries. 12-**

  - 318 ➤ Article 4: KMS Facilities Maintenance Fund
  - 319 ♦ Current balance is \$224,968.  
320 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 4 as presented. Motion Carries.**

  - 323 ➤ Article 5: Elementary Schools Facilities Maintenance Fund
  - 324 ♦ Current balance is \$114,491.  
325 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Chair LeFebvre to approve Article 5 as presented. Motion**  
326 **Carries. 12-0-0**
  - 327
  - 328 ➤ Article 6: AFSCME Negotiations
  - 329 ♦ **Mr. Richard** explained this union covers the bus drivers, maintenance, and custodians. The 3-year  
330 contract has a \$66,648 increase the first year, \$66,785 the second year, and \$42,248 the third year. The two  
331 accomplishments in this contract were increasing the salaries to competitive wages and switching over to  
332 the consumer driven health insurance plan with a cheaper premium.
  - 333 ♦ **Mr. Marvel** commented the real cost of the agreement is triple the first year, double the second year, plus  
334 the third year. **Mr. Richard** noted if the salary increases are going to be counted multiple times then the  
335 insurance savings should be deducted multiple times as well.
  - 336
  - 337 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Jensen to approve Article 6 as presented. Motion Carries. 12-**  
338 **0-0**
  - 339
  - 340 ➤ Article 7: Operating Budget
  - 341 ♦ **Mr. Richard** noted the proposed operating budget is \$38,653,496, noting last year's budget had a  
342 significant savings due to negotiations in health insurance. Included in this budget is the 2<sup>nd</sup> year of the  
343 CEA contract, the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of the CESP contract, AFSCME is up for renegotiations, the 3% performance  
344 increase for non-union employees, and market adjustments for the nurses. The personnel piece makes up  
345 80% of the budget. The Conway School Board developed a side bar agreement with the CESP to go to

346 higher deductible health insurance for a savings. The employer contributions to NHRS by R.S.A. have  
347 increased by 3% for a \$500,000 increase in the budget.

348  
349 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 7 as presented. Motion Carries.**

352 ➤ Article 8: Project SUCCEED

- 353 ♦ **Mr. Richard** noted this is a long-standing program in Conway for elementary ages children, which  
354 provides a before and after school enrichment component.  
355 ♦ **Chair LeFebvre** inquired how success of the program is defined. **Mr. Richard** advised the program  
356 offers tutoring, academic goals, and an opportunity for students to explore new things, while keeping them  
357 engaged in school. This is an enrichment, social, physical, and safe program, which does offer some  
358 convenience for working parents.

359  
360 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Chair LeFebvre to approve Article 8 as presented. Motion**  
361 **Carries. 12-0-0**

362  
363 ➤ Article 9: Equipment and/or School Buses Capital Reserve Fund

- 364 ♦ **Mr. Richard** notes this fund is used to stabilize the increase each year.

365  
366 **Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Chair LeFebvre to approve Article 9 as presented. Motion**  
367 **Carries. 11-1 [Mr. Donohoe]-0**

368  
369 ➤ Article 10: Resurfacing KHS Track and Tennis Courts

- 370 ♦ **Mr. Richard** noted the track and tennis courts need to be resurfaced before further damage is done and  
371 they need to be replaced at a higher cost.

- 377 • **Chair LeFebvre** commented this is a good use of the KHS maintenance funds, presuming the \$1.3  
378 million bond issue passes. **Mr. Colbath** noted with COVID it is important to get people outside and  
379 active as well as maintain the surface, so we don't have to replace at a bigger cost later.
