- Ms. Snow inquired of the restrictions on businesses who have outdoor activities. Mr. DegliAngeli noted
 some of them operate under a special event permit which limits their time and anything outside of that time
 would be a violation of the noise ordinance.
 - Mr. Fougere commented there must be exceptions when noise becomes excessive during permitted hours.
 - ♦ **Mr. Colbath** commented this is a starting point and there will be exceptions and overkill which will be sorted out and revisions can be made based on use.

DISCUSSION AND VOTING ON SCHOOL WARRANT ARTICLES:

Superintendent, Kevin Richard, Presented the proposed operating budget and proposed warrant articles, fielding questions from the Budget Committee and community members.

- Article 2: Replacement of KHS Windows (\$1,300,000)
- ♦ Mr. Richard walked through the window replacement process to this point, which included the Conway School Board initially seeking out a contractor to look at the cost of the project. The initial proposed cost presented to the Conway School Board was approximately \$975,000, however, the School Board for a

- 244 variety of reasons decided to put the project out to bid. The next phase of the project was to have 245 specifications developed to avoid inferior products. The School Board voted to allocate approximately \$75,000 to hire an architectural engineer firm to develop the specifications. Through an RFP Gale 246 247 Associates were hired to develop the specifications and presented 85 +/- pages of specs, which were approved by the School Board. Gale Associates have put out an RFP in the newspapers as well as to other 248 249 companies who have done similar projects on schools. The bids will be received and approved by March 250 1, 2021 in time for the Deliberative Session. Gale Associates provided an approximate cost of \$1.3 million 251 for the project and the School Board voted to bond the project.
 - Article 2 is for a bond in the amount of \$1.3 million without a significant increase to the tax rate, which will be offset by \$855,000 in revenue from the sending towns per the tuition agreements.

Mr. Corbett moved, seconded by Mr. Colbath to approve Article 2 as written. Motion Carries, 8-4 [Mr. Drinkhall, Mr. Jost, Mr. Donohoe, and Chair LeFebvre]-0

➤ Article 2a: Replacement of KHS Windows (\$750,000)

- Mr. Richard advised this is for the same estimated \$1.3 million project with a different funding mechanism. This is to raise and appropriate \$750,000 to be added to the \$650,000 in the KHS maintenance trust fund and utilize these funds to pay for the window project. The difference being with the one-time cost with a significant increase in the tax rate, which will be offset by \$493,000 in revenue from the sending towns per the tuition agreements.
- Chair LeFebvre inquired of the logic in using a warrant article to spend funds that have been contributed to. Mr. Richard clarified the purpose is related to the tax rate, being all at one time or spread out over several years.
- Ms. Snow inquired if the sending towns contribute to the interest costs as well. Mr. Hill noted the sending towns pay 2/3's of the cost including interest regardless of the funding method used.
- Ms. Snow inquired if this would be a 1-year project or several years. Mr. Hill advised the windows would be manufactured in July and August. In September and October some areas will have the windows replaced with most of the work taking place over the summer of 2022. Ms. Snow inquired why not raise the \$750,000 to pay for the windows and take the rest of the money out of the trust fund as needed. Mr. Hill noted the district would be expected to sign a contract and want to make sure the funds are available.
- Mr. Marvel noted along with the KHS maintenance fund there is a school maintenance fund with approximately \$340,000 and a retained balance fund with approximately \$242,000, which all total \$1,25 million. Mr. Hill explained to there is a process to get money released from the retained balance. The maintenance funds are not just for emergencies and are there to maintain the facilities and there are several big-ticket items coming up. Mr. Marvel noted an argument is being made for \$300,000 but not for the \$700,000. Mr. Hill advised it is an option for those who do not want to use a bond, however, with the interest rate at .75% over 5 years, he is in favor of bonding the project and keeping money in the maintenance funds.
- Mr. Marvel commented the School Board should have utilized their latitude and trimmed the budget more rather than put it upon the voters.
- 284 Ms. Snow inquired of the logic in moving forward with Article 2 if both Articles 2 and 2a pass. Mr. Hill advised by statute the bond articles must go first. Mr. Richard noted Article 2a states "should Article 2 286 fail".
 - Mr. Marvel inquired of the plan should both articles fail. Mr. Richard advised they would be back next year asking for funds for the same project. Further noting if the windows fall out the School Board will have to vote on next steps, which creates another issue with phasing the project without the same manufacturing company and materials. Mr. Dziedzic commented waiting another year will also create the bid to increase based upon the current trend.
- 292 Mr. Donohoe inquired if the RFP included a warranty. Mr. Hill noted a standard 5-year warranty comes with the windows; however, they have asked for an option for an extended warranty. Chair LeFebvre 294 inquired if the old windows had a warranty. Mr. Hill noted if they did it is long past. Mr. Colbath noted

- having a warranty will help the taxpayers not feel like we will be in the same situation. **Chair LeFebvre** inquired if the warranty will be part of the presentation at the annual meeting. **Mr. Hill** advised the presentation will include the final bid and the additional 5-year warranty.
 - ♦ Mr. Davison spoke of the potential safety hazard the windows are to staff and students. The voters have been provided with 2 funding options, although with the rates so low it makes sense to utilize the bond for a 5-year period, which will be offset by the sending towns. The concern is there are many projects coming up down the road and this one project could drain the maintenance accounts. Chair LeFebvre inquired when the maintenance fund was last used. Mr. Davison noted it the KHS fund has not been used.
- **Chair LeFebvre** inquired if there are any weak or failing spots on the KHS roof. Mr. Hill noted he is not aware of any.
 - ◆ Mr. Donohoe commented on the roof replacement that has been projected to be approximately \$5 million and inquired why that would not be a bonded project. Mr. Hill advised as part of the strategic plan they entered all upcoming projects they were aware of for placeholder purposes. Further noting the roof projects could be done all at once or done over a period.

Mr. Jensen moved, seconded by Mr. Corbett to approve Article 2a as written. Motion Carries. 8-4 [Mr. Corbett, Ms. Leonard, Mr. Aughton, and Mr. Donohoe]-0

The two accomplishments in this contract were increasing the salaries to competitive wages and switching over to the consumer driven health insurance plan with a cheaper premium.
 - Mr. Marvel commented the real cost of the agreement is triple the first year, double the second year, plus the third year. Mr. Richard noted if the salary increases are going to be counted multiple times then the insurance savings should be deducted multiple times as well.
 - Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Jensen to approve Article 6 as presented. Motion Carries. 12-0-0
- 340 > Article 7: Operating Budget
- Mr. Richard noted the proposed operating budget is \$38,653,496, noting last year's budget had a significant savings due to negotiations in health insurance. Included in this budget is the 2nd year of the CEA contract, the 3rd year of the CESP contract, AFSCME is up for renegotiations, the 3% performance increase for non-union employees, and market adjustments for the nurses. The personnel piece makes up 80% of the budget. The Conway School Board developed a side bar agreement with the CESP to go to

higher deductible health insurance for a savings. The employer contributions to NHRS by R.S.A. have increased by 3% for a \$500,000 increase in the budget.

Mr. Colbath moved, seconded by Mr. Fougere to approve Article 7 as presented. Motion Carries. 10-2 [Mr. Drinkhall and Chair LeFebvre]-0
