The following Budget Committee members were present: Randy Davison, Bill Marvel, Steve Angers, Ellin Leonard, Mike Lacey, Dave Jensen, Bob Drinkhall, Vice-10 11 Chair Frank Jost, Chair Peter Donohoe, Jim LeFebvre, Quentin Lewis, Steven Steiner, BOS Reps: John 12 Colbath, Steven Porter, Mary Seavey. 13 14 **Absent-** Terry McCarthy and Stacy Sand. 15 16 Pledge of Allegiance- Chair Peter Donohoe led the Pledge of Allegiance. 17 18 Vaughn Services 19 20 Dan Jones, Vice Chair of Vaughn Service with Peter Mag- were here requesting \$20,000 for our food 21 bank program this year. The form you received from us is correct, we have been requesting \$20,000 22 for the last few years we only requested \$17,000. There is a higher demand for food pantries. 23 24 J. LeFebvre- what would the impact be if you did not get the full \$20,000. 25 26 P. Mag- we would have less food to give out, and along with that there is a new program the town 27 would like us to start which is filling the needs of non-food items for our patrons. 28 29 M. Seavey- they took over Conway's food bank years ago and have gratitude for what they are doing. 30 31 R. Davidson- I think it is admirable that this continues every year. 32 33 Dan Jones Vice Chair of Vaughn Service with Peter Mag- we are requesting an additional \$2,500 for the 34 learning center this year mainly because we have had to make a tremendous increase in wages just to 35 hold onto our staff. Surrounding companies like Walmart increased their wages and it is a difficult time 36 for us to lose staff. 37 38 Q. Lewis- do you ask other towns for money? 39 40 P. Mag- we have not asked other towns; we do have some clients from Maine, and we get assistance 41 from Maine. 42 43 S. Angers- It looks like you are projecting a decrease in funding from the state and feds, what is going 44 on with that? 45

Willette- that number is a hard number to pinpoint, it is based on a Maine state scholarship, and it changes year to year and is a guessing game that we try to average and figure out.

Childrens Unlimited

Artis Yana and Kathy Livingston- we are asking for level funding this year to support our family resource center. This past year we supported eighty-five families in Conway.

R. Davison- I am for the program but from a budget standpoint I feel you should be asking other towns for more funding. Conway is giving you \$14,000 cash plus an abatement of \$10,000.

B. Marvel- I see your budget has decreased, but you are still looking for the same amount of money, why?

Artis Yana- staffing changes were why the budget went down, but costs have gone up but we feel like asking for level funding and not asking for more.

B. Marvel- if I am reading it correctly your income was \$17,000 greater than your expenses last year, which is a lot of money, and we gave you some of that, why is there not a proportional decrease?

Artis Yana- we can look at that next year when we budget for next year, but that is our budget numbers for this year.

S. Angers- is your abatement 100%? And what is your interaction with school liaisons?

Artis Yana- I do not know the abatement, and yes, we have a close relationship with the school.

73 S. Porter- this is a great program that we have. It is important to grandparents like myself in Conway. 74 This program does not get the platform they deserve and \$14,000 is a small amount to contribute.

76 S. Angers- Are you allowed to do fundraising?

Kathy Livingston-our funding efforts are earmarked for our childcare to help offset the costs to families and childcare.

R. Davidson- I would like to see the towns who also contribute listed.

Starting Point

Deborah Weinstein- thank you for your continued support for victims of domestic violence, sexual violence, and human trafficking in Carroll County. We provide 24-hour 365-day services, we have a crisis line, we work with both hospitals and courts, and police stations. We work to advocate for our clients in the community. In 2023 we asked the Town for \$17,804. We served 142 victims in Conway and provided 3,786 services not including bed nights. This year we are asking for \$18,174. I want to clarify we only count Conway residents who come in and are homeless.

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B. Marvel- what is the bed nights number?

92 D. Weinstein- 3,641. 93 94 J. LeFebvre- this year you are budgeting \$96,000 that is more than last year from what you received 95 from municipalities. Where is that money coming from, or would you anticipate getting additional 96 funds? 97 98 D. Weinstein- we anticipated asking the County for some funds. We also run on the state budget cycle 99 as well. Last year we had a one-time donation of \$100,000 to pay off Pleasant Street as we need to 100 purchase the building from the Trust. 101 102 S. Angers- are you not doing the golf tournament anymore? 103 104 D. Weinstein- no we cancelled it last year as it took too much staff time, and it was not worth what we 105 brought in. 106 107 M. Seavey- if you went to the county would you also go to the individual towns? 108 109 D. Weinstein- we have in the past because we needed money. We would love to just ask for the 110 municipality money. It is time-consuming going from town to town asking for money. 111 112 **White Mountain Community Health** 113 114 JR Porter- we are wraparound service, medical, dental, substance abuse and behavioral health and a 115 lot of other services. We provide services even if they do not have the ability to pay. You can be 116 insured or uninsured. We had forty-three clients show up. We tried to keep it flat in our request, we 117 are at \$178 more than last year and have been consistently asking for \$35,600, this year we are asking 118 for \$\$35,778. 119 120 B. Marvel- What is the rational with the \$178 increase? 121 122 JR. Porter- that is just how it landed in the spreadsheet formula. 123 124 J. LeFebvre- describe your rrlationship with Memorial Hospital-126 127 us community benefits as well as they give us the building to use. The buildings are free, the

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JR. Porter- the hospital is required for theor non-profit funding to give community benefits. They give maintenance is free.

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Conway Area Humane Society

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Tim Westwick- we took in 154 animals from the Town of Conway, which breaks down to eighty-nine cats and sixty-five dogs and in terms of overnights that totaled 4,817 for an average daily cost of \$25 for cats and \$35 for dogs. That is about \$130,000 for services to the Town of Conway. We are asking for \$10,000 which is a flat number for at least the last 7 or 8 years.

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North Conway Community Center

- Sheryl Kovalik and Phil Willette- we come to you asking for level funding of \$65,000. We continue to provide traditional diverse programs and amenities to youth, adults, seniors, and disabled adults. We facilitate youth sports, summer camp, adult programs, and instructional classes, we have added volleyball, pickleball clinics. We partner with a wide variety of outside organizations, non-profit organizations, and accommodating their programs and allowing them to fundraise in our facility. This request makes it possible for us to keep these programs affordable for low-income families and fixed income seniors.
- J. LeFebvre- looks like your grants, fundraising and other sources are up and those contributions are
 up. Would you have an issue cutting your requests to the Town?
- P. Willette- Yes, we would. We had a 1x donation in the amount of \$40,000. We always look at how to cut costs and save. If we cut funding requests, we'd have to look at lowering the services we provide.
- J. LeFebvre- in 2023 you budgeted \$31,003, you received 56,100 where did that money come from?
- P. Willette- we held our 75th community celebration event that was not budgeted for and we secured funds from that. Our golf tournament and our Mud Bowl concessions funds were up over the prior year.
- S. Angers- have you given consideration of going to the Town of Conway and asking to take over their program and or folding your organization into the Towns program.
- P. Willette- no, 75 years as a non-profit is a fairly good success rate and we've been making things happen and were doing it the right way. I don't think I'd ever want to take over Conway Rec unless they pay a director a little bit more.
 - S. Porter- I think both programs work well together, and I think they both serve a wide variety of children and adults. The fact of closing one or the other, I think you're getting a little cheap. If you look at the impact of your tax rate, both programs really don't hurt your tax bill.
 - S. Angers- all these causes are worthy causes and I'd love to be able to fudn all of them, but we are looking at almost \$450,000 in expenditures to the taxpayers, that's a chunk of tax revenue, so that's why I am asking these questions.
 - J. Colbath- as a cost benefit analysis, if we did not have these organizations providing the services that they do, your tax dollars would be quadrupled to provide for the same services. We have such a benefit in these nonprofit organizations who provide services. Nonprofit organizations for the lst five years have passed by the voters from 80% to 95% of the voters because the public knows and appreciates the services that they provide to this town.

Gibson Center for Senior Services

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David Smolen- this is my 7th day on the job. Our request for 2024 is \$36,500 for the 5th year in a row. 75% of our services were given to Conway residents.

- 184 J. LeFebvre- how much work did you do to prepare this work?
- 186 D. Smolen- Ken and Maryann did this work.

S. Angers- what is the Administrative Director Controller position?

190 D. Smolen- that is Ken Cass position basically HR Dept, like a COO.

P. Donohoe- we really appreciate the degree to which you report back to us.

Tri-County Community Action Programs

Jeannie Robard- this year we are asking for \$22,100, which has been flat since 2020. We base this on a formula per capita based on census figures and we ask every single town in our area based on this formula. We serve over 25,000 individuals in Carroll, Grafton County, and Coos County every year. Last year in the town of Conway we served 1,269 individuals and we put \$4,249,095 worth of services back into the community. The services that we offer here include fuel assistance, energy assistance, we have our transit program including having a mobility manager working with the regional coordinating council making sure that CDC money comes in and supports other entities.

B. Marvel – is there a homeless outreach worker in this county?

J. Robard- I wish there were an easy answer to that, we do have a staff member out of Tamworth that covers Conway, the funding is very volatile and ever changing. We are scheduled to lose \$250,000 on those services this year.

R. Davison – this non-profit provides Conway residents \$4,249,000 worth of services for the cost of only \$22,000, that's a valuable service that they offer.

J. LeFebvre-you are looking at about \$20 million dollar cut in your budget can you talk to that?

J. Robard- there was a huge leap in 2022 because of the NH Emergency Rental Assistance Program. Tri-County Cap put about \$36 million or so back into the community with that emergency rental assistance program that is now over. We will not have that for this coming fiscal year and that is the drop. We had Covid money that went away, and other additional federal and state money that went away.

Northern Human Service- not present.

Mount Washington Valley Adult Day Care Center- not present.

Way Station

Karen Albert- we are in our 4th year of operation we are a homeless center; it is a day center. We do provide services to the homeless to those in Mount Washington Valley. We are a part-time operation, we are open 2 days a week, we are looking for funds to expand our services to full-time to the community. We are asking for \$15,000.

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231	J. Colbath- Are you trying to find a facility to use?
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233	Nathan- we are currently housed in what the Lutheran Church and Nativity calls the Ministry center.
234	They offer us the space for free. We do hope that this center can be developed to provide some level
235	of housing. The only shelter we had closed was in Wolfeboro and it closed so there is no shelter in the
236	county. We have a study going on to see what can be done with the center we have.
